Finally, we have also emailed our Safeguarding Bulletin which I would encourage you all to read. Have a peaceful Easter break.

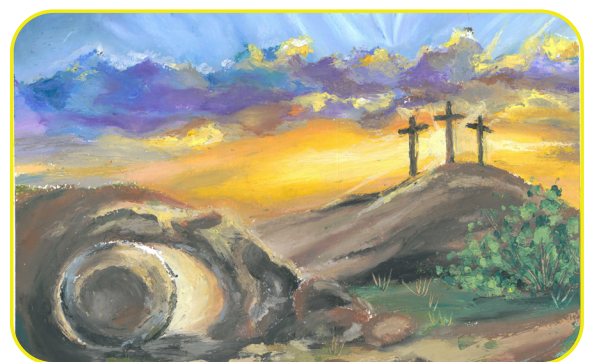


HAPPY EASTER!

The sale took place in the Library at break and lunch time for a week - there were 100's of books to choose from!

They raised £126.43 which is fantastic. Well done to all of the students involved!



WHAT MAKES A GOOD ARGUMENT?

Recently our Year 12 students had a session together to discuss 'what makes a good argument?', and then put these skills into practice.

One of the students, Peter Raistrick, said "We started by looking at what adverts were trying to convince us of, and whether they did this effectively, with most people concluding they presented their information illogically or tried to manipulate the facts in a deceptive way.

We then moved on to Aristotelian syllogism - using two premises to justify a conclusion, then using this conclusion as a premise for the next conclusion, and so on. This was really helpful as it got us thinking about why we believe different things and how we can successfully put across an argument. We also looked at how to spot flaws in these arguments and what we could do to improve them.

Finally, we split into groups and came up with arguments for or against the existence of God, developing our arguments using Aristotelian syllogisms. This was a really great way to test our beliefs and to give our arguments real depth. It was also good to see people who had different opinions trying to understand each other's arguments."

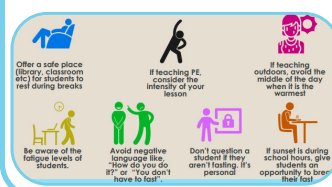
RAMADAN 2022

This year, Ramadan begins on Saturday 2nd April and it falls during the ninth month of the Islamic calendar and is observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting, prayer, reflection and community.

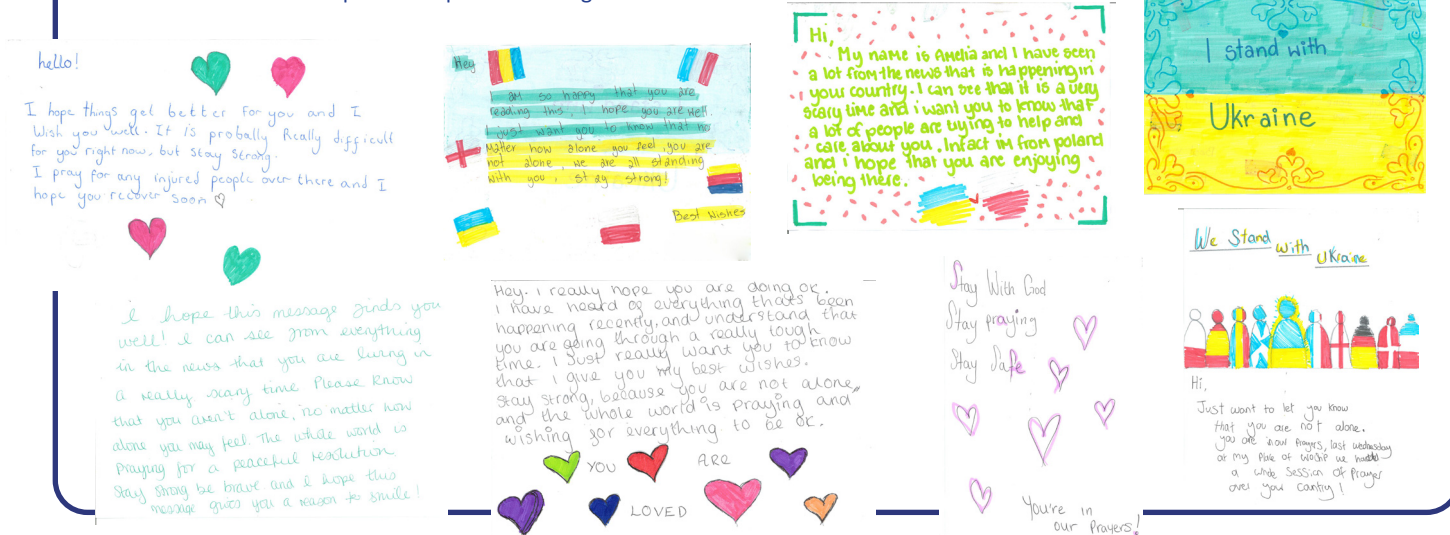
SHOWING OUR SUPPORT FOR THE PEOPLE IN UKRAINE



No one could have missed the sights coming out of The Ukraine in the news over the last month or so, and at Blue Coat we are doing what we can to help and support those affected by the crisis.

As well as raising money by wearing blue and yellow, the colours of the Ukrainian flag, some of our students have written messages of support to any refugees who might make their way to Coventry. The school also helped a local Polish church with donations of sanitary products which they were collecting for Ukrainian refugees.

Prayers have also been said for all those affected on both sides of the conflict, in the hope a resolution can soon be found and that peace can prevail once again.



AMAZING ARTWORK!

Blue Coat School has been given the opportunity to borrow two amazing pieces of artwork from the Arts Council Collection - UK's most widely seen collection of modern and contemporary art.

The purpose of the project is to inspire students and support learning across curriculum through artwork. The works will be on display in the school for two years.

Recently, students selected the two pieces of work to be installed from a shortlist provided by the Arts Council. The theme of the artworks is 'Spirituality and Multiculturalism' which reflects the school's values and diverse student population.

Mrs Caplin explained about each piece and what it represented and about the artist, then the students involved voted for their favourites.

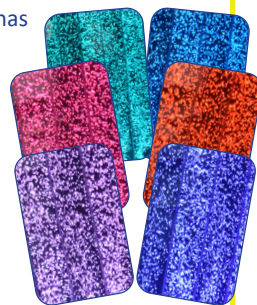


THE HUB MAKEOVER

The Hub area in our school is a very special place to be and it has been undergoing some fantastic renovations recently.



We now have a sensory zone. A sensory space contains objects and resources intended to assist with calming students down and allowing them to relax and refocus if upset or overwhelmed.



The Social Zone is a multi-purpose room and, as the name suggests, is where a lot of the socialising takes place. Students use the space to sit and eat their food, make friends and socialise with others. It is a safe space for break and lunch. There are books to read and games to play if anyone wants to use them. Interventions and small group work take place in here too, during the day.

The Well-being Zone is a flexible space consisting of two small sofas, work tables, natural decoration and foliage. Students who need some space for time out can use this area. As a naturally quieter space away from other students, quieter mentoring conversations can take place or students can work independently, such as when revising for example. Staff are often seen completing work in the Well-being Zone as the work space means that it is a productive and flexible area.

We are grateful for the support from Mrs Husbands, the Inspire Trust Inclusion Lead, who worked alongside our Hub staff to make these much needed changes to benefit our children.



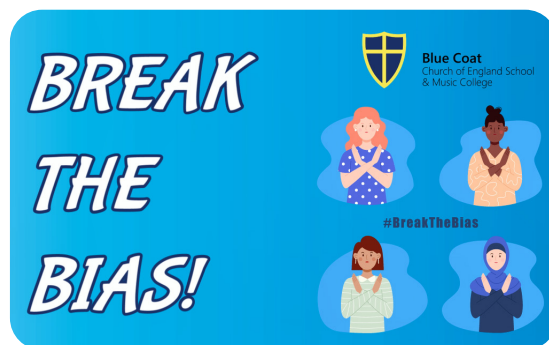
INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

On Tuesday 8th March, staff and students across the school celebrated International Women's Day.

Imagine a gender equal world. A world free of bias, stereotypes, and discrimination. A world that is diverse, equitable, and inclusive! Blue Coat advocates equality for all and here is a snapshot of how we deliver on this!

Women working at Blue Coat School took part in the international 'Break the Bias' campaign aimed at breaking gender stereotypes. Whether deliberate or unconscious, bias makes it difficult for women to move ahead. Knowing that bias exists isn't enough; action is needed to level the playing field and by taking part in this campaign, we hope to raise awareness and let the 900 young ladies at Blue Coat they have the ability to achieve their full potential and that they are empowered to know there are no limits to the impact and legacy they can leave on this world!

In their RE lessons, students were exploring an inspiring woman that linked with their current learning.

- Year 7 are currently learning about the last week in the life of Jesus. They learnt about Mary Magdalene, one of Jesus's closest female followers. She is mentioned by name twelve times in the gospels, more than most of the apostles and more than any other woman in the gospels, other than Jesus's family.
- Year 8 are currently studying Hindu traditions and world views. They learnt about Kiran Bedi - she is a retired Indian police service officer, social activist, former tennis player and lieutenant Governor of Puducherry. In 2003 Bedi became the first woman and the first Indian to be appointed United Nations civilian police adviser, and she has received many awards in India and abroad.
- Year 9 are currently studying religion and science. They learnt about Nina Tandon, a biomedical engineer who is changing the world of cell science. She is the founder and CEO of EpiBone, a company that grows bones for skeletal reconstruction.
- Year 10 are currently studying GCSE Islam beliefs. They learnt about Dr Hawa Abdi, Somalia's first female gynaecologist. She dedicated her life to providing high-quality healthcare, education and shelter to vulnerable people, even in times of war and famine.
- Year 11 are currently learning about religion, peace, and conflict. They learnt about Sandra Imam Pertek, Islamic Relief's senior policy advisor for gender. She said: "We recognise education not only as an opportunity but as an obligation for everyone."

ACCELERATED READER MILLIONS

All of our Year 7 and Year 8 students attend lessons in the school library once a fortnight to participate in our Accelerated Reader programme, which encourages them to keep reading and helps them to progress in their literacy.

They are encouraged to read in between their library lesson and taking the quizzes on the books they have read.

Library Manager, Mrs Treadwell, said "It has been really encouraging to see how many students ring the bell when they achieve 100% after taking a quiz."

Members of our Senior Leadership Team are regularly popping into library sessions to award students with the badges and certificates for achieving over one million words individually! Below you can see some of the Word Millionaires with their certificates and badges.

The competition is on! Since September the Year 8 students have read an amazing total of 46,070,765 words between them but the Year 7 students have just passed them by reading a whopping 48,404,474 words! There isn't much between them so watch this space in the next newsletter to see if our Year 8 students can reach the top spot again.

Recently our students were asked "What does Easter mean to you?" - here you can see their answers

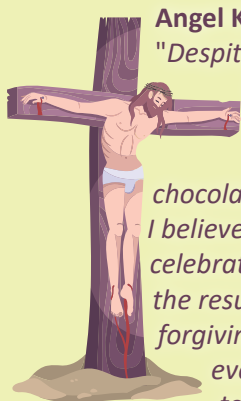

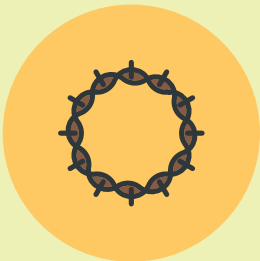

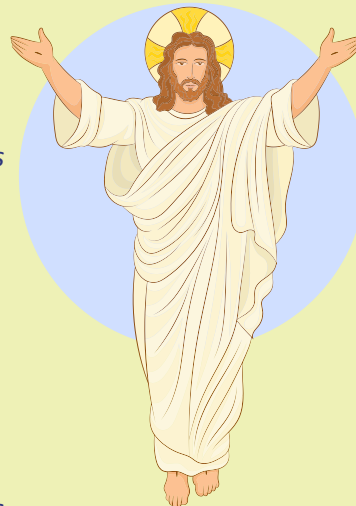

There were activities held in the library including a Big Book Quiz and 'Guess Who Is Coming To Dinner?' competition. All students who participated earned achievement points for their House.

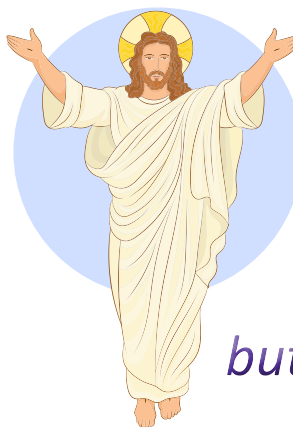
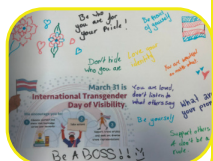

Trans Day of Visibility takes place on March 31st each year to celebrate trans and non-binary people and raise awareness of discrimination faced by trans people worldwide.

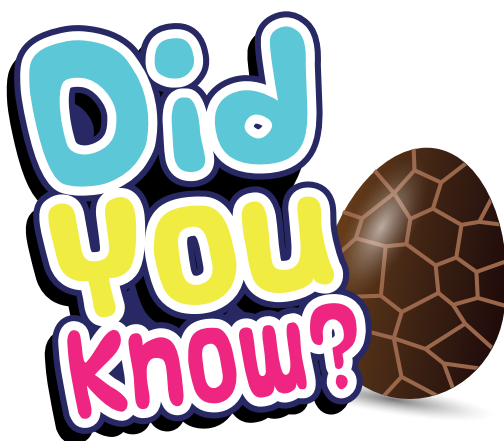

The world's largest chocolate Easter egg was made in Italy in April 2011. It measured 10.39m in length, and weighed approximately 7,200 kg.

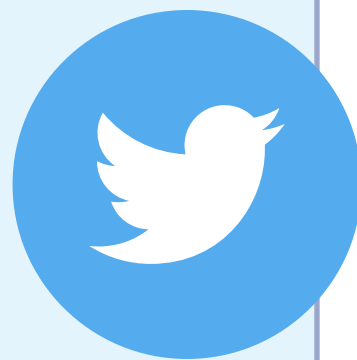

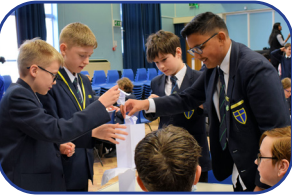


FLIGHT TO SUCCESS!

We were recently joined by staff from the Royal Academy of Engineering and the Smallpeice Trust who delivered a half-day session to some of our Year 8 students based on flight engineering.

During the session, the students learnt about different aspects of flight, how aircraft fly and the engineering that goes into them. The students then had to make aircraft in their teams out of various materials, thinking about costings. They then had to see whose aircraft would fly the furthest with the least amount of money used.

Miss Preece said "We are lucky to have this relationship with the Royal Academy of Engineering and Smallpeice through The Lord Bhattacharyya Engineering Education Programme. This session has given students the opportunity to get a taste of what it's like to be an engineer and we hope that it will help them to consider STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) careers in the future."



MEETING BISHOP CHRISTOPHER

We were very grateful to have Bishop Christopher visit us this half term to recognise our recent accomplishment on achieving a gold award for the work we do in all areas of equality, diversity and inclusion.

The Bishop met with a number of students including those that attend the Social Justice group where students explained projects they had led on over the last year and also the significance of this award in the context of the school vision and the importance of courageous advocacy and working for an equitable society.

ETHICS IN AN AGE OF SCIENCE

Recently our Year 13 students took part in an RE conference led by speaker Mark Hamill. The conference focussed on the question of 'ethics in an age of science'. One of the students involved, Orna Dixon, said "We were taught in an engaging and interactive manner about the different types of world-views including naturalism and supernaturalism. This was an interesting way of approaching the different ethical problems we discussed. We came to understand that people's opinions differed because of the difference in our different world-views - a concept that will be useful for our studies in our A-levels but also further education."



Orna added "We learnt about the landmark case of Stephen Mobley. Having confessed to cold-blooded murder, he was the first to offer genetic evidence as an attributable factor to his violent crime. The defence was based upon the discovery of a 'criminal gene' from a study by Dutch scientists, and as such, the question was posed to us whether Mobley should be tested for this gene and how the results should be used. We were asked to formulate and explain our argument, making note of our world-view and our view of freedom (free will/determinism). Some brave volunteers stood up to present their argument, with the winning group being awarded a box of chocolates!"

Overall, the conference was a unique and fascinating opportunity to improve their problem solving skills in a new and thought-provoking way.
