HRH PRINCE OF WALES VISITS COVENTRY CATHEDRAL

This week we celebrated the 59th Anniversary of the consecration of the new Coventry Cathedral. The new Cathedral was built following the bombing of the medieval Cathedral in 1940. Provost Howard had the words 'Father Forgive' inscribed on the wall behind the Altar of the ruined building and it is these words that form the response in the Litany of Reconciliation. The Litany is read every weekday at noon in the Cathedral and used throughout the world by the Community of the Cross of Nails.

During the past 18 months, due to the pandemic, we have missed being in the Cathedral. It has always offered our school community an opportunity to celebrate with our Prize Giving Service as well as worshipping together during key Christian festivals including Easter and Christmas. However, despite our absence from this building, the Litany of Reconciliation still sits at the heart of what we believe as a school as we grow and nurture a generation of young people that will challenge themselves and others to be advocates of the change we need in our world.

As an ICONS (International Cross of Nails School) we work closely with the Cathedral to enable our students to positively impact our school and local community, to challenge prejudice, to foster peaceful relationships and to celebrate diversity. As part of this ongoing work and in response to Student Voice, our students were involved with promoting peace and reconciliation in a number of ways this week. As an ICONS school we are committed to embracing the three core themes: Healing the Wounds of History; Living with Difference and Celebrating Diversity; and Building a culture of Peace

On Tuesday 25th May, the City of Coventry was visited by two key members of the Royal Family - HRH Prince of Wales, and his wife, The Duchess of Cornwall. As well as visiting many important City of Culture sites, they also visited Coventry Cathedral for a special service. Four of our Year 11 students were given the honour of reading words from the Litany of Reconciliation during the service. Peter Raistrick, Miracle Boma, Kisanet Yacob and Katy Hall were chosen by Mrs Hathaway to represent Blue Coat School in the reading of the Litany. They stood at the front of the Cathedral and read beautifully in front of a socially-distanced congregation which included the royal dignitaries.



Members of the Cathedral Choir included Blue Coat choristers Nathan Ayres, Libby Blunt, Emma Corrigan, Rita Musa and Thea Robinson.

After the service, the Reverend Kathryn Fleming wrote to Mrs Hathaway to say "A huge thank you to you, and to the students, for your poised delivery of the Litany, and for the sheer delight of being the one to tell them who our VIPs actually were." The last sentence is in reference to the fact that the visit was not made public and it was very difficult to keep the exciting visit a secret!

Reverend Fleming added "We had such a lovely morning and it was brilliant that you were part of it."

Mrs Shelley said "I am always incredibly proud of our students in the way they represent the school at such occasions. It is such an honour to be asked to represent Blue Coat School at any event but to be asked to do so in front of members of the Royal Family, in such a prestigious building is very special indeed."

We are delighted to announce we are improving our parent and student communication and, as well as a brand new website, we will also soon be launching a fantastic communications app - WeDuc.

This new platform has been tried and tested by other schools not only in the UK but across the world and it is considered a game-changer when it comes to home-school communication. It comes highly recommended to us by other schools.

From inside the WeDuc app you will be able to see your child's details and update them; pay for items; send messages to staff; report absence; read our digital noticeboard as well as being able to view your child's behaviour and achievement points. You will also be able to access the school calendar as well as Class Charts and other apps and information from within the WeDuc platform.



We will also soon be launching another product linked to WeDuc - SchoolCloud which is a fantastic Parents' Evening booking system which includes video meetings. We are trialling this after half-term with our Year 7 Tutor Evening.



COVID-19 TESTING

SYMPTOMS OR NO SYMPTOMS TESTING

If your child, or family member has [Covid-19 symptoms](#) - they need to be taken for a PCR test at a certified test centre. The home testing kits (lateral flow tests) *do not work* on people *with* symptoms. Lateral Flow tests are only for people without symptoms (asymptomatic) who may still carry and spread the virus. Please continue to ensure your child carries out their home testing each Sunday and Thursday. Please remember to let us know immediately if your child has a positive test result (click on the logo below) - and then book them a PCR test at a test centre.

To report a positive Covid test (PCR or LFT) for your child, or if any member of your household tests positive for Covid-19, at any time, please remember to let us know by clicking on the logo, or emailing admin@bluecoatschool.com. Thank you for continuing to help us to keep our community safe.



KHALSA AID FUNDRAISER

As you will have seen in news reports, Covid-19 has ravaged India recently, leaving many sufferers without life-saving oxygen supplies.

BLUE COAT SAYS YES TO EQUALITY






HAPPY, HEALTHY MINDS

Our minds are beautifully complicated and brilliant machines. For much of our lives, these machines run efficiently with minimal maintenance. However, just like our other organs, they do require some proper attention every now and then and recognising this at an early age can help as children progress into adulthood.

Happy, Healthy Minds is a guide designed to help children become more aware of their emotional needs and examines a range of topics that might give their minds difficulties, for example:

- When parents don't seem to understand us.
- When we are finding it hard to make friends.
- When we feel angry, anxious or lack confidence.
- When school feels boring or difficult.

The book explores a range of common scenarios encountered by children and talk about some of the very best ideas to help deal with them. By offering a sympathetic and supportive framework, Happy, Healthy Minds encourages children to open up, explore their feelings and face the dilemmas of growing up armed with emotional intelligence.

STEPHEN LAWRENCE DAY

On Saturday 22nd April 1993, Stephen Lawrence, at the age of 18 was murdered. A young, black school boy, born and raised in South London, standing innocently at a bus stop. Not bothering anyone nor speaking to anyone, minding his own business, when out of nowhere five white gang members chased down the young man and brutally stabbed him to death.



According to his father, at the time the murderers did not know what they were doing. Not only did they take the life of a human, but a student, friend and most importantly, a son.

He didn't know his killers and his killers did not know him, but to his killers, his black skin said it all. Racism has been a threat to society for hundreds of years, but Stephen Lawrence seemed to be the only one to bring the attention of this issue to the forefront of the media.

It could have been any black person which is why Stephen Lawrence's day is all about equality; not forgetting about the past but changing the future for the better. It's not easy to always forgive, neither was it easy for Stephen's parents. But as practising Christians, they knew that forgiveness was the best option. Yes, the killers took a very beloved person from so many people, but at the same time, Stephen's legacy changed the world for the better.

His parents knew he has a bright future but instead of letting their son's death get to them, they changed society for the better and taught us what forgiveness is all about.

In a very special live assembly attended by 9X1 in RE, we tuned into Stephen's mother and brother. In an enlightening discussion, they told us forgiveness is about our mind-set and what we would sacrifice ourselves for.

Stephen Lawrence was an ordinary person but his death has led to a legacy of change.

VISITING SCHOOL SITE

RAMADAN AND EID

Muslim members of our Blue Coat family took part in the holy month of Ramadan which was then followed by Eid celebrations.

Below, some of our Muslim students explain to us about Ramadan and Eid in their own words.

Zahrah Mahmood, Year 8, said: "Ramadan is a special event for Muslims. This is where we don't eat or drink from dawn until dusk. This lasts for 29 to 30 days. Ramadan is a time of spiritual reflection and self-improvement. It teaches us to practise self-discipline, self-control, sacrifice and empathy for those who are less fortunate."

The month of Ramadan helps us get closer to God (Allah) and it is also a time for families to gather and celebrate. The act of fasting is meant to remind Muslims that they should be grateful for whatever they have. As one of the Five Pillars, or duties of Islam, fasting during the month of Ramadan is mandatory for all healthy adult Muslims.

Eid ul-fitr is a very important festival that happens after Ramadan. Muslims depend on the moon and that decides Eid. This is where we invite all family around and we gather to eat food and exchange presents."

Year 8 student, Mustafa Barzanji, shares his thoughts on Ramadan and Eid with us: "Ramadan is a holy month for people who follow Islam where we fast for 30 days and we don't eat or drink from sunrise to sunset. Ramadan will connect you back to Islam and change you as a person. You will become more humble and kind. Ramadan can be long and tiring but we busy ourselves with reading the Quran (holy book) or giving Zakat (charity).

When Ramadan is over, we celebrate Eid. We play all day and feast with friends, neighbours and family. We wear our newest clothes and visit all our relatives and share with them the joy or exchange gifts. The Eid we celebrate after Ramadan is called Eid al-fitr which marks the end of the fast of Ramadan.

I fasted for the whole of Ramadan - Alhamdulillah (praise be to God). I also managed to finish the whole Quran by Laylatul Qadr (The last Sunday of Ramadan). For the entire time of Ramadan I spent most of my time playing football during break and lunch with my two friends and reading the Quran when I got home."

Musa Azeem, also Year 8, said "For me Ramadan was kind of hard but reconnected me back to God. It is also to realise how lucky we are that we have food and how the homeless do not have any. Eid is a very fun celebration which only happens twice a year. It is like Christmas where we come together to rejoice with family and have a big meal for lunch and we also open presents. This is a fun time for everyone, and everyone cannot ever wait for it. It is not just about presents and family and celebration it is about getting closer to God (Allah)."

FUN WITH POETRY

During the January lockdown, one of our Year 10 student, Lucy Merrylees, participated in a poetry workshop led by Coventry poet John Bernard and BBC radio producer Mollie Davidson which is a part of Coventry's City of Culture.

Lucy said "We talked about the relevance of poetry in our modern world and the importance of emotion and expression through our words.

We discussed Ed Sheeran as an example of using words (in his case lyrics) as a way of connecting with people on a personal basis, not only through the words, but his simple style and intimate concerts also create the authentic and emotional feel that audiences enjoy.

As part of the workshop, we had the opportunity to write our own poems inspired by the topics that interest us or are significant to us, and then submit them to Mrs Hathaway to be put forward for the BBC Contains Strong Language Festival 2021.
