### **WORLD OF NURSING**


Year 12 Health and Social Care students were offered the chance to take part in a "World of Nursing" Enrichment Program offered by Coventry University. This program gave them an opportunity to learn about the world of nursing and where a nursing degree can take you.

Students were given an activity book to explore the various environments where nurses work, familiarise themselves with today's nursing equipment, hear from Coventry University current student nurses and discover the numerous different pathways into nursing!

In addition, they could take a virtual tour of Coventry University nursing facilities using the QR code provided within the program materials and research the number of nursing courses on offer and the entry requirements needed for each course.



When any student joins a new school, they are usually a little nervous - maybe worried about making friends or wondering if they get lost, where the toilets are or how the canteen works etc. Imagine worrying about these things when you have only just arrived in the UK and if you only speak the language of your home country. Any student in this situation who joins Blue Coat need not worry because we have a team of specially trained, enthusiastic and caring students who are our EAL (English as an Additional Language) Ambassadors.

Students were give the opportunity to apply for this special role and we were amazed and humbled by the applications! We now have 32 EAL Ambassadors from Year 7-12 - Joshua, Shalom, Mihnea, Leonor, Joy, Hadya, Cami, Yvana, Savin, Mustafa, Zofia, Patryk, Julia, Kithu, Gabriel, Sharusha, Naimah, Daniel, Kevin, Sarunja, Arianna, Pirunthan, Yara, Stephanie, Aditya Shree, Abigail, Abdirahman, Jamie, Christy, Pauline and Kelly. Between them speak 18 languages which include Cantonese, French, Romanian, Portuguese, Yoruba, Spanish, Tamil, Kurdish, Polish, Memon, Igbo, Arabic, Italian, Somali, Mandarin, Hindi, Farsi and Persian as well as speaking fluent English!

Their role is to meet and greet new Blue Coat students who speak their language - make them feel at home, help them to make friends, show them around school and generally be available for them as long as they need them.

In their applications, the EAL Ambassadors showed such care and empathy - their desire to care for the new arrivals was fantastic to see.

Our Ambassadors will not only support new students from overseas, but they will also be able to act as interpreters for new parents. Together they have made this pledge:

Mrs Shelley said "We would like to thank you all for applying for the role and for being such caring, respectful and empathetic young people. It is truly a pleasure to have you as part of our school community and we are amazed by your multilingual skills!"

After completing their application forms, the group received training in how to carry out their roles and they are now all ready to meet our new students which will include Year 6's joining us on their Induction Day on 6th July. All of the EAL Ambassadors were awarded a certificate and a badge to wear on their blazer which identifies them easily.

One of our Ambassadors, Year 8 student, Joy, who speaks Yaruba, said "In my opinion I think

that I would be a good EAL Ambassador because firstly I love to help people; secondly it would be better for them to have someone who can communicate in their language. Also, it saves the school from paying people to translate for people who can't speak English and lastly it would be my dream come true to know that I am actually helping someone that needs help."

Year 9 student, Mustafa, said "I came to this country hoping for a better education. My first hurdle was the language barrier but, as I learned English, it opened up doors and opportunities that lead me to here. I want to help those around me and help open new doors for them and help them overcome the problems I've faced before. It will give me some good work experience for when I'm older."

Naimah, who is in Year 10, said "I like to help people help and it would be a good experience to have and also making new friends who have the same backgrounds as you. Also, having been in this position before and understanding how hard it is".

Post-16 student, Abdirahman, said "As someone who went to a school in Somaliland, not knowing the language at all, I can understand how hard it is. So I'd like to help out whoever I can."

Stephanie, who is in Year 10, said "I know how hard it is coming to a new country and having to start afresh. From personal experience, I would have probably had an easier time if I had someone around my age, who could speak Italian, and have helped me with settling in."


