WEDUC UPDATE

From September we have been using the Weduc app for all of our communications - emails, messaging, calendar updates, news, notices and information.

All students, parents/carers and staff have access to the Weduc app.

The uptake has been fantastic and 85% of our students have a parent or carer who have logged in to Weduc to set up their account.

All parents/carers have been sent their unique login details.

From inside the Weduc app you are able to see your child's details and update them; pay for items (via ParentPay); send messages to the school; report absence; read our digital noticeboard as well as being able to view our newsfeed which is our own social media platform. Soon you will be able to view your child's behaviour and achievement points and send messages their teachers directly.

You can also access the school calendar as well as Class Charts and other apps and information from within the Weduc platform. There is also a Hub area which is full of useful information and links. We will soon have our new website which will integrate with the app.

From inside the Weduc app, you are able to click on a link to SchoolCloud, the Parents' Evening booking system which includes video meetings for our virtual Parents' Evenings year. All of our Parents' Evenings are now virtual.

If you are one of the few parents/carers still to log in to

Weduc, please use the login details which have been emailed to you. Please download the Weduc app from your usual app store. If you click on the logo (right)



you will see an overview video.

To ensure that you receive all of our notices, newsfeed information, app messages etc., please remember to enable your device to receive Weduc notifications. If you have the relevant settings, you will have already been receiving notifications with a green W.

We are currently working in partnership with Weduc to enhance the app further and make it even more useful to parents and carers.

Students can log in to the Weduc app using their Blue Coat email address and password (the one they use in their Computing lessons).

Our Black History Month competition launched at the start of October to celebrate this year's theme 'Proud to Be'.


Blue Coat students were asked to make creative pieces that embody the theme.


WHY WE LOVE

been nice and welcoming.





LOCAL AND NATIONAL CHURCH OF ENGLAND PARTNERSHIP WORKING

We are proud of our strong relationships working alongside the Christian Church in Coventry, with our Diocese, Diocesan Board of Education and the national Church of England. These relationships continue to mean that our students can access all kinds of exciting partnerships and opportunities as we together strive towards the 'Life in all its fullness' that Jesus talks of in John 10:10.

This term so far, we have been blessed by a number of virtual assembly speakers – including Curates from our friends St Marks, Coventry. We have great working relationships with our local churches and so are looking forwards to their involvement in assemblies as the year moves forwards, and if safe to do so, communion services to restart at a number of local churches.

Plans are already in full swing for our Prizegiving and Carol Services at Coventry Cathedral – such special times for us as a school community together and ones that we have sadly missed over the pandemic. Our staff and students have made the best of these times however, with end of year, Carol and Easter 'Services' together using video services showed in tutor time. We hate missing an opportunity to worship together.

Our Chaplain, Lou Peet, says "I have been blessed to be part of a team of writers on the Faith at Home project – a national Church of England campaign to support the faith development and pastoral care of primary and secondary students. This has involved writing Collective Worship materials which have been made into resources (written and video) used in Collective Worship across the UK, including here at Blue Coat.

Blue Coat sits within in Coventry East Diocese. I now sit on Coventry East Deanery Synod and am the lay chair of the Diocesan Missions and Pastoral Committee. This means that the experience of our students who live very locally to the immediate area around the school site is fed back at a local strategic Diocese level and change facilitated."

Groups of our students have been involved last and this academic year in the Church of England's National Younger leadership Groups, which is a year-long programme to develop leadership skills and character, facilitating them to become a catalyst for positive change within this school and their wider spheres of influence.

Our students have been part of national vision and strategy consultation work, used to shape the thinking around the interfaces between church, home and Church of England Schools and to feed back to prominent theologians and academics around youth experience of these spheres. It is important that our young people have these opportunities to learn and to input, to enable and build empowered and youthvalidated expressions of church going forwards.

On Friday 15th October a group of our students were involved in interviewing for the very important job the Head of the Growing Faith Foundation. We were asked by the Deputy Chief Education Officer to be a youth interview panel. This process involved learning about interview processes, deciding on interview questions based upon the Job Description, and interviewing four candidates online followed by a feedback session to national Church of England leadership to help them to determine the best candidate for the role.

Whether working at local, regional or national level, Blue Coat is excited to continue to shape, and be shaped by, the Anglican and wider Christian Church.



INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE

Each year, the International Day of Peace is observed around the world on 21st September. Established in 1981 by unanimous United Nations resolution, Peace Day provides a globally shared date for all humanity to commit to peace above all differences, and to contribute to building a culture of peace.

To celebrate this important day our Year 7 and 8 students wrote postcards with messages of peace to primary schools in Coventry. 
