ACCELERATED READER NEWS

As we come towards the end of term we are delighted to celebrate some more Word Millionaires in our Accelerated Reader programme. These include Year 7's - Kanishk, Kyle and Timeon for achieving their bronze badge and certificate this term and also congratulation to Year 8's - Teni and Aarna for joining the Millionaire's Club.

So far our Year 7's have read over a whopping 20 million words between them and Year 8's have read over 11 million words.

HARD WORK The Accelerated Reader programme encourages students to choose from a vast range of books within their level and when they have finished they take a guiz about the book on the computers. There can be anything from 5 to 20 questions depending on the size of the book and they need to get 85% right to pass the quiz. The words are added to their own personal word count and we have a board with league tables showing achievement for class against class.

Regular reading is so important for students of all ages. It expands their vocabulary, helps with their spelling and allows them to be more confident with their written work across the curriculum. For our students to succeed in Accelerated Reader and see regular improvements we expect them to be reading for at least 15 to 20 minutes per day.

UNIFORM SWAP SHOP

In order to help alleviate the cost of school uniform, particularly in the current financial climate, we have opened a 'Swap Shop' – this is open for students to bring in any item they would like exchanging for a different size. We have skirts, trousers, PE kit, shirts and blazers available to swap.

Child poverty action Group, Cost of School Day, identified a lack of school uniform to be a significant barrier to learning and school attendance. In Coventry, the need for a preloved uniform supply was identified as a primary need for the city.

If, at any time of the year, you have items of school uniform that you would like to donate to the Swap Shop, please feel free to drop it in to Reception. We would be grateful for all donations. We have been overwhelmed by the kindness shown by members of the Blue Coat family with the fantastic donations we've received. Thank you to everyone who has donated. This has helped so many children in our school who now have a warm uniform.

In line with government legislation we are reviewing our current school uniform in order to ensure it is not too expensive for parents/carers. We will update you as soon as any decisions are made during the first half of 2023.

Updates from the Hub: our Inclusion Department

What is the Hub?

The Hub is the school's Inclusion Department. It is located underneath the Library on the ground floor. The Department contains an open plan 'Curriculum Zone' where students work supported by staff, a Social Zone where students can make friends and access peace and quiet during social times, a Sensory Zone and various meeting rooms and offices where interventions take place.





What goes on in the Hub?

There is always something going on in the Hub! During registration you might find students practising their typing skills or having a morning check in with a staff member. Many students receive one or more 20 minute interventions during period 1, developing their core skills of literacy and numeracy. Later on in the day you might see students in a small group dyslexia intervention, working with an external agency, or completing work independently in Supported Study.





Enrichment in the Hub

This half term students in the Hub have been set a challenge to design their own superhero during their breaks and lunches. Everyone's work is celebrated and has gone up on display. Special mention goes to Sarah Coxhead for her fantastic artwork and creativity! As well as superheroes, students have been sharing their favourite jokes and riddles and they have been writing Christmas poems for display in the Social Zone.

Student Passports

At Blue Coat we place a high emphasis on high quality teaching, and teachers make adjustments in class to support students with additional needs. Students on the SEND Register, and some other students as well, have a Passport written which is sent to teachers outlining some of their strengths and things they might struggle with. Students share their views on the Passports and we also seek parent/carer input when these are

reviewed.

Who are the key

contacts in Inclusion? Students on the SEND Register are assigned a Key Adult in the Hub. This Key Adult will be in touch with parents/ carers regarding updates for their child. They will make regular check ins on their key students and oversee their progress in school. Parents/carers are encouraged to contact their child's tutor, House Head or Key Adult if they have any concerns. Mrs Ram, the SENDCo, can be contacted directly and the SEND team have a dedicated email address for queries: send@bluecoatschool.

Merchant of Venice

Staff really enjoyed the recent production of 'The Merchant of Venice'. It was fantastic to see students grow in confidence and develop their skills. Hub staff wanted to give a big shout out in particular to Rosie (Year 12) and Noah (Year 10) for their confidence in performance. Well done to the whole cast and crew!



Intervention Focus: Lexonik

Lexonik is a new intervention which the school has started this term. Lexonik aims to improve reading age by 27 months in just six weeks' intervention no matter their starting point. Mrs Newman and Miss Ciomag have finished their Practitioner training and have completed their first groups this half term. They are focusing on groups of Year 7 students to begin with but will also deliver the

programme to other year groups as well.

LEXONIK

The first cohort of Year 7 students

to attend the Lexonik interventions have engaged very well throughout the literacy programme. One of the activities that we did during the programme was to attempt to read 74 syllables within one minute. One of the groups read 22 syllables in their first intervention and by the time we had our final intervention they were able to read all 74 of them. One of the pupils happily exclaimed: "At the beginning I thought it was possible to read so many syllables in just one minute!". I am sure that we can all agree that this group of pupils made the impossible possible.




