WHAT'S MY NAME?

We all have a name and names usually have meanings. Our students were asked to share their name and the reason they were given that name. They were asked to share where their name originated or if there is anything special about their name etc, or if there is a story about their name. Some have a family nickname or a name their friends call them. Here are some of the names of our students and their stories. Look out in the next newsletter for more!



Kiynyuy Lukong

My name is Kiynyuy Lukong - pronounced key-new-way. My name was given to me by my grandad on my father's side. My mum wanted me to have a unique name with a religious meaning behind it, as my family is Christian. My dad suggested the name Kinyuy pronounced kin-new-wee, this means in Lamso, my dad's native language, 'God knows'. But this was a very common name in Cameroon. After my grandad suggested Kiynyuy adding a 'y' after the 'i', changing the meaning to 'You should know God'. My mum loved this name for the meaning and the fact that it wasn't a common name. This is how I got my name.

Lotanna Akabogu

The name Lotanna means "Never forget father", "Remember the father" or "Always remember God".



Rienna Kumar

My name is Rienna Kumar. Rienna means "great queen" and I'm just that. Kumar means child and is also the name of Kartikeya, the son of Shiva. The lucky number of the name Kumar is 9 and the lucky days are Wednesday and Friday. The name Kumar mainly comes for the south side of India and north side of India (Punjab side).

Grace Jones

My name was planned to be Courtney! This was changed to Grace, though I'm not sure why, personally, I think it's to show beauty and "Gracefulness."

Nehemia Kiflom

My name means "Yahweh comforts" in Hebrew, derived from נחם (nacham) meaning "to comfort" and יְהוָה (yah) referring to God.



SWITCHED ON TO DANGERS ON THE RAILWAY

Our Year 7 students recently took part in a really important, and potentially life-saving, rail safety session.

Mrs Gates, our Year 7 Pastoral Lead, organised the assembly about the importance of rail safety. Education about rail safety in Key Stage 3 can provide young people with timely information and equip them with the skills to stay safe as they enjoy greater independence in their teenage years.

This presentation, led by PC Ettienne from the British Transport Police, forms an important part of their PSHE curriculum. On 31st March 2023, the 'Rail Safe Friendly' initiative was launched nationally. The initiative was introduced to raise safety awareness in all schools and decrease trespassing on the railways. The tragic death of Harrison in 2017, when he was in Year 7 at Guilsborough High School, brought home the importance of teaching our children about safety on the railways, and we recognise that schools play a vital role in keeping our children safe. The session taught the Year 7's about the dangers not only of going on the railway tracks but also near to them - electricity can jump - a fact that a lot of them didn't know.

HARD WORK

GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP

Geography students in Years 12 and 13 participated in a fieldwork day in Stratford, London, as part of the Changing Places topic. The first location visited was E20, a regenerated area of East London. Students completed surveys in the Olympic Village, where athletes stayed during the 2012 Olympics and where many social media influencers currently reside. They then carried out questionnaires with the locals to gather the feelings about the local area. Students found the area to be very affluent, aesthetic and relatively expensive, scattered with fancy eateries. There was also evidence of SuDS (Sustainable Drainage Systems) that demonstrated the 11-year-long impact of the Olympic legacy.



After a stop at Westfield Shopping Centre and a walk-through Stratford Market, the geographers arrived in E15 Carpenter Estate in the afternoon. Here, students completed more questionnaires along the high street and Year 13's investigated local house prices, in order to compare the difference with the sites visited in the morning.

An enjoyable time was had by all and it was pleasing to see Geography with real life examples, with many of us having been on a field trip for the first time, due to the pandemic.

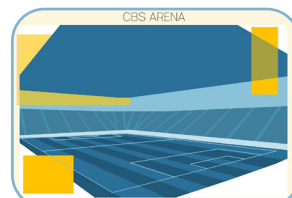
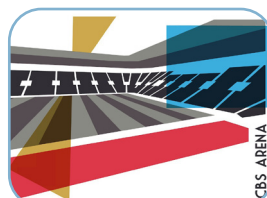
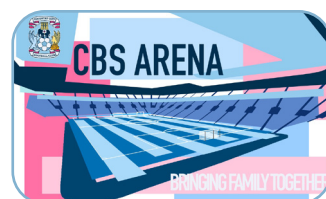
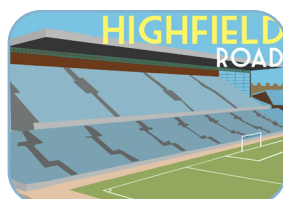
FIRE SAFETY LESSONS

CCFC PROGRAMME DESIGN PROJECT

Our amazing Graphics students had their work exhibited at Coventry City's Coventry Building Society Arena recently, taking inspiration from the Sky Blues in their latest project. They worked on a project around programmes, inspired by the old Sky Blue programme designed by John Elvin in the 1970/71 season. His style as a designer was ahead of its time - cut-and-paste action shots, with Expressionist-style filters, pop-arty patterns, close-up photo portraits of players and a wide variety of typography. While he was only at the Club for one season, his pioneering work raised the bar for match day programmes and is still hugely respected to this day, and is studied by many. Our students designed a range of imagery, using the style that was pioneered by Elvin but bringing them into the modern day.

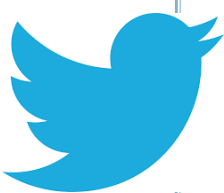
