After fifteen years as Bishop of Coventry, he leaves us this month to take up his new post as Dean of Windsor, where he will continue his christian service to King Charles. During his time in Coventry, Bishop Christopher has been a strong supporter of Church of England Education and especially of Blue Coat school. He frequently visited our school and was known well to students and staff alike, having sent his own children to study here. As Bishop he actively contributed to our 'Excellent' SIAMS inspection in June 2022 and celebrated our EDI (Equality, Diversity and Inclusion) Gold Award last year. He has been a strong advocate of all members of the Blue Coat community, in particular celebrating and bringing together those of other worshipping communities and faiths. I attended his service of Thanksgiving on Saturday 4th November and was delighted to see so many of our Blue Coat students in the cathedral choir to mark this occasion. Particular thanks go to Libby, Emma, Zack, Sophie and Jordan. We would like to dedicate this edition of Fullness to Bishop Christopher, thanking him for his years of service to Coventry and wish him every blessing in his new post.

He has displayed such bravery as he underwent two surgeries - first to amputate three of his fingers and then a second to remove the rest of his hand and forearm. Rian has had to undergo months of chemotherapy in an attempt to halt the spread of the disease - you can read more on page 10.

Facing buttering toast for his breakfast with his remaining hand and realising how difficult this is, Rian set a challenge to others - "Can you butter toast with one hand?!"

Coventry police rewarded members of our Youth Council recently with a trip to the West Midlands Police Museum.

They had the pleasure of meeting Rani Gundhu, a trailblazer in the police world, whose accolades include being awarded six medals and the title of QPM (Queen's Police Medal), Honorary Doctorate Positive Action, National Women in Policing Awards and the longest serving female officer.

The students were immersed into the changing landscape of policing and learnt valuable insights into key moments and individuals in Coventry and West Midlands. They got to solve a crime using forensic and questioning techniques and got to experience cell life in the Victorian era.

THE BIG AMBITION – CHILDREN'S SURVEY

In the lead up to the next General Election, the Children's Commissioner wants to take children's thoughts, opinions and ideas to decision-makers, to make sure that the Government hears young people's voices on what they think needs to be done to make children's lives better in England.

The Big Ambition is open to children and young people in England aged 0-18 years old and will be open until Friday 15th December.



The survey has been sent to schools across England so they can hear from children and young people aged from 6 to 18. Parents are also being encouraged to complete the survey for those who may need additional support or on behalf of younger children (under 6) to make sure the needs of early years children are represented too. IGNITE YOUR PASSION: WORK INSPIRATION DAY 2023!

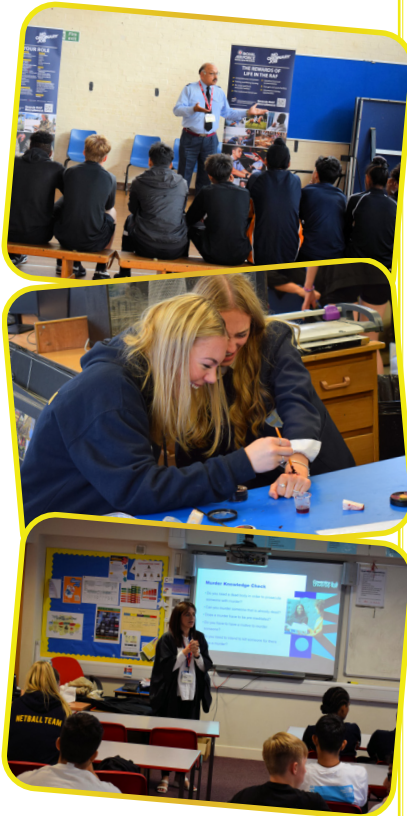
At the end of the last academic year, we held our first Work Inspiration Day for all Year 10 students.

OUR HARDSHIP FUND

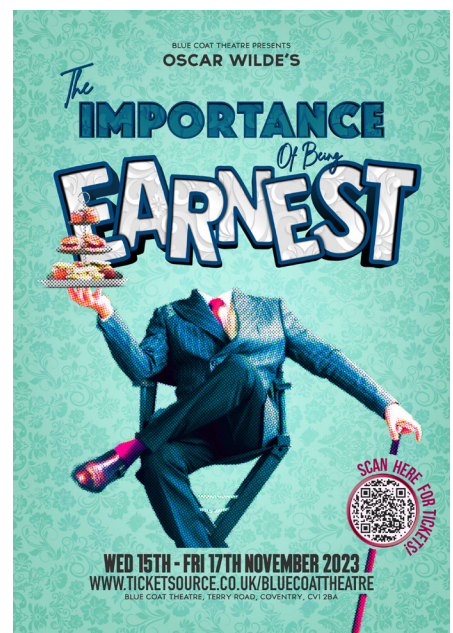

We have been running the *Talk for Work* intervention programme in school for a while now, and five students have all worked extremely hard learning new skills, language and learning the importance of the communication chain.

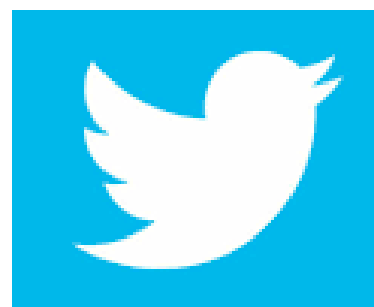
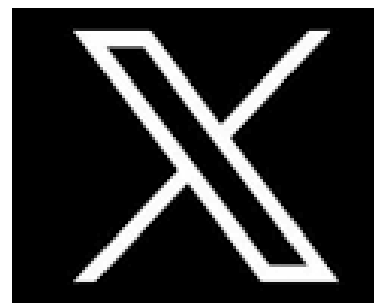

The winning cake was baked by Mrs Treadwell, one of our Science Technicians."

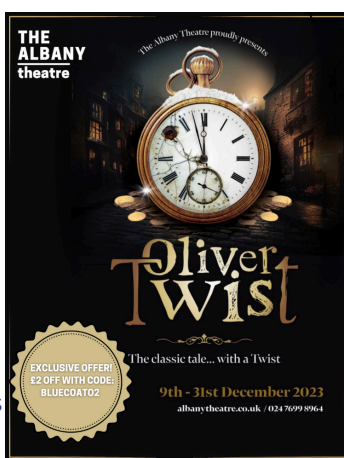
Between the bake sale and contributions from staff and students towards the charity we managed to raise £118.93.

Mr Johal said *"I am immensely proud of the team and of the way they conducted themselves throughout the game."*



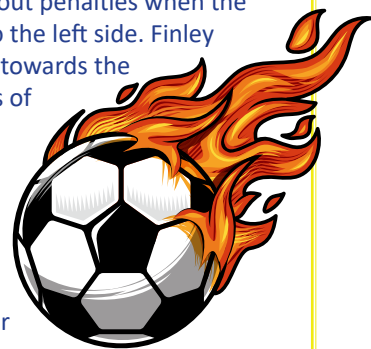
YEAR 11 FOOTBALL VICTORY

Well done to the whole squad and we look forward to hearing all about your next game!

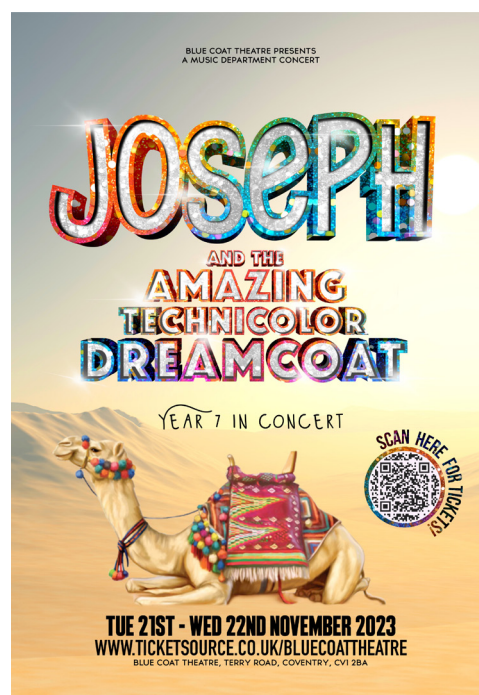
PRAYER MEETING

As a symbol of his triumph as the ninth round ended, he rang the bell at the hospital's end-of-treatment ceremony, a moment that brought tears of joy to those who witnessed it.

Rian's strength and determination were evident as he stood at the front of the room, surrounded by the support of family members, hospital staff, friends and well-wishers. Rian bravely read out a speech, which he wrote himself. After Rian's speech, the sound of the bell rang loudly, echoing the triumphant spirit of a young boy who had faced adversity and emerged victorious. His infectious smile illuminated the room, reminding us all of the power of resilience and the importance of community.

The occasion was not just a celebration of Rian's personal triumph, but also a testament to the collective strength of the community that supports Rian. Rian's friends from All Saints Primary School who are now in his tutor group at Blue Coat were invited to attend, as well as their parents and Mrs Gates and Mrs Curtis.



Some of Rian's friends at the bell-ringing, included Maisy Elkins who said "Rian is the bravest boy we know. Even after all he has been through he is still such an amazing and kind-hearted person. I have thoroughly enjoyed every minute of his company and getting to know him over the last 6 months and it was lovely to see how popular he is with all the staff, doctors, consultants and support workers at UHCW and Birmingham Children's hospital. Mrs Curtis said "It was a great privilege to have been invited to such a special occasion. Since getting to know Rian and his family over the last few months, I have realised just how tough this journey has been for them all and, no matter how hard it has been, Rian always has a smile on his face, despite the pain and feeling so poorly. We are all incredibly proud of Rian and the way he faces his daily challenges with such determination. The bell-ringing was very emotional for all who witnessed it."

Whilst Rian has ended a gruelling nine rounds of aggressive chemotherapy, he still must undergo another long period of maintenance chemo and we wish him all the best as he takes the next step on his journey. Everyone at Blue Coat School is thinking of you, Rian, and we pray for your speedy recovery.
