OUR YEAR OF CELEBRATION

In October, Year 8 student, Ethayani Ethayakumar celebrated Navaratri, a ninenight Hindu festival where people get honour Goddess Durga in different forms each night.

Worshippers pray, fast and have cultural parties. There are dances including Garba and Dandiya, making the air lively and everyone dresses in bright clothes.

On the tenth day, 'Vijayadashami', they celebrate the triumph of good over evil.

Ethayani celebrated with her friends by taking part in Bharatanatyam Dance. This is Ethayani in the photo above.

> Diwali, or the Festival of Lights, is a joyous celebration marked by colourful traditions. Celebrated by millions of Hindus globally, especially in India, it signifies the triumph of good over evil. People clean and decorate homes, light oil lamps called divas or divas and create vibrant Rangoli patterns. Families exchange sweets, gifts and wishes, fostering a sense of togetherness. They often have fireworks at night time, adding to the

festive atmosphere. Diwali holds cultural and religious significance, uniting communities in

prayers and rituals. It's a time of feasting, laughter and family celebrations.

Dhruti and Dhruvi Modasia, who are twin sisters in Year 7, celebrated Diwali with their family. Dhruvi said "To celebrate Diwali we light up small oil lamps called 'divas' and place them around the house. Before we do this, we clean up the house as we believe that if the house is clean, we get good luck. We celebrate Diwali because of the return of Lord Rama and Goddess Sita."

Dhruti added "To celebrate this occasion, me and my family give gifts and do fireworks. My favourite thing to do is Rangoli which is when we create patterns with colours made from powdery substances. The purpose of Diwali is to celebrate Lord Rama and Goddess Sita, accompanied by Rama's brother Laxman, and their arrival from a 14 year exile."

Isa Azeem, who is in Year 11, and his family recently celebrated Eid, although he said he and his twin brother, Musa,

had to revise for their mocks at this time.

The Muslim celebration of Eid signifies the end of Ramadan, featuring prayers, feasts and acts of charity. It embodies unity, gratitude and spiritual rejuvenation, creating a festive atmosphere of celebration within the community.

Year 9 student, Najeeb Khan, also celebrated Eid this year and he said "My family come together and celebrate and eat together."



Our school is a vibrant tapestry of cultures, and we love celebrating the diverse festivals that make our community unique. As we approach the end of the calendar year, our families were invited to share with us their celebrations from the last twelve months.

Year 7 student, Amayah Leese, says "*I enjoy Easter* and it is a time that I spend with my family. To me, it is really important because it celebrates Jesus dying and rising again. It is in the Easter holidays and it falls in March or April. Easter is a time where Christians remember the sacrifice that Jesus made on the cross for us. I celebrate Easter with my close family and relatives. It is our tradition to go to the same place, go to a certain area, have an Easter egg hunt and play games. We always have certain foods like hot cross buns, disciple cake and Easter eggs.

The hot cross bun has a cross on to remember Jesus on the cross. The marzipan disciple cake is to remember Jesus and his friends, some loyal, one a betrayer and one a liar. It marks three days after His crucifixion. We


sometimes fast up to the day with Pancake Day (Shrove Tuesday) 40 days before Easter Sunday and I think it is just really special to remember it."



One of our many Sikh students is Sanjot Nagra, Year 7. Sanjot said "We have many celebrations including Vaisakhi". Sanjot explains "Vaisakhi is a celebration

which took place on April

14th and it is all about Guru Gobind Singh Ji (our 10th Guru) who created the religion Sikhism. It is very special to me because it helps me learn more about my religion and even if you're not Sikh you can still celebrate! I celebrated it with my family and friends at the Gurdwara. I also take part in 'Seva', which means 'selfless service' and I also love to do 'Gatka' which is Sikh martial arts."

As Muslims, Year 7 student, Jana Darwish, and her family enjoyed their Ramadan and Eid celebrations this year. Jana said "For Ramadan, everybody knows that we must fast which means we don't eat as soon as we wake up and until sunset. People think that even if your pregnant, sick or if you

have diabetes or low blood sugar you must fast. No, not at all! Fasting when you have these things can be very dangerous and shouldn't be attempted. As a child you can (if you want to) practice fasting which means you can skip breakfast, go to school, and drink and eat lunch.

Or you can skip breakfast,

lunch, and complete the fasting.

As a teenager though, we believe you

should fast for the full day until sunset unless you have a genuine reason to not. We also sometimes do a deep clean and buy new bedsheets and clothes. We donate to charity, but this could depend on the family. The reason behind fasting is to put yourself in the shoes of more unfortunate people. Poor people are starving and homeless and we put ourselves in their shoes. We pray that Allah will bless them and help them. Eid is celebrated because it's a celebration after Ramadan and our parents buy us gifts, special sweets, clothes, baklava (sweets) and we also go to people's houses and gift them sweets and handmade food." > On Thursday 2nd November, Oscar Kunz, Year 8, celebrated the Polish 'Day of the Dead', known as 'Zaduszki,' which is a special time to honour loved ones who have passed away. Families visit cemeteries, light candles and share memories. It's a day filled with love and remembrance as people come together to celebrate the lives of those close to them. Oscar also celebrated Easter with his family.

Cousins, Rian Dodd and Amisha Karia celebrated Diwali, the Hindu festival of lights recently. This year, Diwali fell on the 12th November but is on different dates every year.

The family celebrated by doing Rangoli's (a colourful design made on the floor by the entrance of the house to welcome guests), visiting the temple, getting together with family and friends, having lots of lovely food, having a party, letting of fireworks and last but not least exchanging presents! We hope our Hindu students, families and staff had a

lovely Diwali.

Year 8 student, Jane Air-Obarogie said "I celebrate Easter by praying to God and I celebrate Christmas by having lots of food and put up decorations. I do these celebrations with my friends."

Easter is a Christian holiday celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It usually includes church services, egg hunts and sharing meals with family. Easter eggs and the Easter Bunny are symbols of new life. The holiday signifies hope, renewal and the victory of light over darkness.

Year 7 student, Aima Adedoja, along with her family, celebrates Eid and Ramadan. She

also celebrates these occasions with friends, sometimes doing a barbecue with them.

Ramadan is a special month for Muslims. They fast from sunrise to sunset, refraining from food and drink. It's a time for prayer, reflection and community. Muslims break their fast with a meal called 'iftar'.

Ramadan teaches self-discipline, empathy and gratitude, fostering a sense of unity among followers of Islam.

Year 11 student, Pitiyas Ghebrebrhan, is Eritrean, and he said "We celebrate our cultural new year by going to church and we go to visit family and friends and eat



food. Every Resurrection Festival (Fasika) we fast for the whole day the we go church at night and complete our services and light really special candles."

Fasika, is a significant Christian holiday celebrated in Ethiopia and Eritrea. It commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The occasion involves special prayers, fasting and a festive meal featuring special food. It symbolises spiritual renewal and joy. Pitiyas is one of the people holding the umbrella over the priest here, during a service in Eritrea.

December 7th marks the start of Hanukkah. We would like to wish a blessed and iovful Hanukkah to all those who were celebrating.



Hanukkah, or Chanukah in Hebrew, is the Jewish festival of light. The word Hanukkah means 'dedication' and celebrates one of the greatest miracles in Jewish history.

Betiel Brhane, who is in Year 10, said "We have a called Lidet which is like Christmas and it is so good and also Meskel (Finding of the True Cross)".

Meskel is a Christian festival in the **Ethiopian Orthodox and Eritrean** Orthodox calendar is celebrated for two days.

'Gurpurab' is one of the most important festivals for the followers of the religion of Sikhism. It is celebrated to commemorate the birth anniversary of the first Sikh Guru. Sikhs attend prayers at Gurdwaras, listen to hymns and share meals. It promotes unity, equality and selfless service. The day is marked with joy, reflection and community spirit, fostering values of

compassion and kindness among Sikhs. One of our Sikh students who celebrated this festival is Jasraj Rihal who said "Gurpurab is the birthday of Guru Nanak Dev Ji, the founder of the Sikh religion. It is celebrated in the month of November on the day of the full moon. Gurdwaras (Sikh Temples) are decorated in flowers and lights to mark the occasion and the Sikh community gather at the Gurdwaras. Food is served to all those attending (Langar). Many people and businesses also donate food which is then served as Langar. This year's celebration on 27th November." We hope our many Sikh students, families, and staff enjoyed their Gurpurab

Miheli Udawatte's family are Sri Lankan and, according to their astronomical calendar, the new year is celebrated on the 14th of April every year. It is the biggest celebration in their yearly calendar. Miheli's family say "The celebration is called Aluth Avurudda (in Sinhalese). We greet each other by saying "suba aluth avuruddak wewa' ('wishing you a prosperous happy new year')."

They added "This is an auspicious time and we wear colourful clothing. We light an oil lamp and offer prayers in front of the Buddha, seek our elders' blessings and eat milk rice prepared with coconut milk along with a range of delicious traditional sweets that we prepare just for the new year. Firecrackers are lit when the auspicious time begins. The celebrations continue for a few days where we visit our friends and family and share the joy by exchanging gifts and plates of food. We try our best to follow all that here in Coventry so that Miheli learns and enjoys British and Sri Lankan cultures."

Nehemiah and Shalom Samuel Arce and their family celebrate the 'Carnaval de Oruro' which hails from Bolivia and is a lively festival blending ancient customs with Catholic traditions. People wear vibrant costumes and masks, dancing to rhythmic music in a colourful parade. It honours the Virgin of Candelaria, showcasing Bolivia's rich culture. The celebration is a joyful spectacle, drawing crowds with its vibrant and diverse.

Christmas is another favourite time for Mara and she said "Every day of December, me and my family try to do as many Christmas crafts as possible. I love to decorate for Christmas."



AV1: ENABLING EDUCATION BEYOND ADVERSITY

In the face of adversity, our resilient Year 7 student, Rian, continues his educational journey from home as he undergoes treatment for cancer. Meet AV1, the robotic companion designed to bridge the gap between the classroom and Rian's home. This cutting-edge technology serves as Rian's eyes and ears, whilst he can talk via the robot, enabling him to join in with lessons, connect with classmates and stay engaged with school life. Despite physical distance, Rian remains an integral part of our school community through AV1, fostering a sense of inclusion and support.

Even though Rian can't yet attend school in-person, the robot, who he has named "Super Robot-iano", after his love of all things Super Mario, means that he can still virtually attend classes, interact with teachers and be an active participant in his lessons. Super Robot-iano not only facilitates Rian's academic involvement but also allows him to share his personality, interests and unique perspective with his peers. Rian has embraced this new way of learning with such enthusiasm!

When asked about AV1, and how it felt to use it for the very first time, Rian said "The first time I was very apprehensive about the idea of seeing everyone but after a couple of minutes of listening to the teacher and looking around the classroom it wasn't too scary. Also, I didn't really know what to expect at all but after Mrs Curtis and Mrs Gates came round to show me how it worked prior to my first lesson, it wasn't too bad!"

Rian was asked how he feels using it now, and he said "Sometimes I get nervous when I join a new lesson and wonder what people may think of the robot or if I'll be able to keep up with everyone else during the lesson. But it's also exciting as I get to see all of the children and teacher - I see too much of my mum!!"

Rian has joined quite a few lessons now, using AV1, all whilst also attending hospital education lessons at University hospital, attending medical appointments in Coventry and Birmingham and having hospital education lessons at home, whilst having daily chemotherapy. Rian, when asked "Do you feel any different now you have used AV1 more?", said "I think after using the robot I feel when I finally do get to go into school everyone will already kind of know me instead of wondering who I am. I also feel that since I am attending more and more lessons, I'll get to meet my teachers and my classrooms from an electronic point of view. Overall, I think the robot is amazing!" Rian added "I think the best thing about the robot is that you can change the robot's eyes so that people know what you are feeling".
