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### **COMPUTING DEPARTMENT GOES QUAKERS!**

This term Year 10 and Year 13 have been trailing a different way of improving oracy and literacy in Computing. As Year 10 build their skills up in python and Year 13 complete their programming projects, one way they can support themselves is to talk to the duck!

Head of Computing, Mrs Kershaw said "The idea is that when a programmer needs to debug their code, they should explain the program line-by-line to a rubber duck. Often, the act of explaining the problem step-by-step will cause the solution to present itself. This is a safe way students can talk through

their code, articulate what they are programming to help in spotting syntax errors, without being judged or feeling uncomfortable talking to others about what they want to code.

The beauty of Rubber Duck Debugging is that it need not be confined to programming it can work across any subject when you need to solve a problem

Key Stage 3 will be introduced to this concept as we move into the programming element of their courses in the summer term."

## Inspirational Women

I have two inspirational women! The first is Jameela Jamil who is an actress and activist. Jamil has a podcast named 'I weigh' that encourages radical inclusivity and creates a safe space for people to share their thoughts. The podcasts cover a range of present-day

issues like debunking diet culture, body neutrality

and mental health.

The second is **Dr Phyll Opoku-Gyimah** who is known for her work for racial, gender and LGBTQ+ equality. She is the cofounder and chief executive of UK Black Pride and former executive director of Kaleidoscope Trust. She has raised the issue of racism in the LGBTQ+ community and spoken about the importance of intersectionality.

**Miss Clemo** 

Amanda Brown (with credit also given to Brigid Kerrigan) is an American novelist who wrote the novel Legally Blonde, which was the basis for the 2001 film and 2007 musical of the same name. It is also the inspiration for our recent school production Legally Blonde! The screenplay for the film was

written by Karen Lutz and Kirsten Smith and then performed brilliantly by Oscar winning actress Reese Witherspoon.

The musical was part written by Nell Benjamin and Heather Hach and our performance will showcase some of the amazing female performers (and some boys) from our school (directed and choreographed by the amazing Miss Boyle).

Mr Walls

Sarina Wiegman is inspirational for her work in English football history, she was the first coach to lead the Lionesses to a major title when England won UEFA EURO 2022 on home soil. Not only

was it historic for the Lionesses, but also for Sarina as she became the first coach to win back-to-back tournaments having led her native Netherlands to the Euro 2017 title five years earlier.

She is widely regarded as one of the best international coaches in the women's game, Sarina began her role as England head coach in September 2021.

**Mrs Curtis** 

Heddy Lamarr was a Hollywood actress - a star in the golden age of cinema, but her true passion was inventing. It is because of Heddy's frequency-hopping invention that we have Bluetooth and Wi-Fi today. I love that this Hollywood actress, known

for her looks, was in fact a vital part of our modern technology - a true reminder that we shouldn't judge people based on how they look.

Katherine Johnson was a mathematician whose calculations were vital during America's race to the moon; calculating the trajectory for the May 5, 1961, space flight of Alan

Shepard, the first American in space. Katherine worked during a time of racial and gender barriers but she ignored them - she simply told people she had done the work and therefore she belonged there.

Rosa Parks is inspirational to me for her bus boycott and how she stood up for the lives of Black People in America.

Sophie Williams, Year 8

Jacinda Ardern inspires me because she became the youngest female Prime Minister of New Zealand and was the youngest female head of government in the world. She was also the first Prime Minister to be pregnant whilst in office and she inspires women never to compromise on what they want, and to believe that anyone can have power, a career and a family.

**Mrs Gates** 

Malala Yousafzai for me - I love that Desmond Tutu nominated her for the children's peace prize. She is the youngest ever Nobel Peace Prize laureate, Malala is a global phenomenon known for her campaigning for women and children's education. In her home town of

Mingora in the Swat region of Pakistan, she was an active blogger and human right campaigner, working with international journalists to document life in the area, being later nominated by Desmond Tutu for the International Children's Peace Prize.


