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
Shermeen - My Future. My Career. My RE

## AN INTRODUCTION TO THE A LEVEL COURSE

- A Level Religious Studies is made up of three components- *Christianity, Philosophy of Religion and Religious Ethics.*
- Each one of these three components are equally weighted at 33% each.
- There are three exams (one for each component) at the end of year two, and each of these are two hours long.
- There is no coursework in this subject.
- We follow the Eduqas exam board.

### Essay Guidance

While studying the course, we will practice our essay writing skills, improving our ability to put forward a written argument. We write two different types of essay at A Level, a descriptive one (we call that AO1) and an evaluation one (we call that AO2). For now, we begin with using the TRADEC skills you are used to, to practice our evaluation essays.

#### T – Thesis

Put forward your point of view on the statement. Do you agree/disagree?

#### R – Reasons

Using paragraphs, give 2 or 3 reasons why you hold your opinion. Remember to support the points you make with evidence. Can you use Scripture? Can you research and see what a scholar has said?

#### A – Agree

In this paragraph, be specific about a person or a group who might agree with the points you've said. For example, do Catholic Christians agree with you? Why? Does Dawkins agree with you? Why? This can be a hard section of your essay, if you cannot think of anyone specifically, don't worry.

#### D – Disagree

Give 2 or 3 reasons why someone might disagree with the reasons you have given for your point of view. Use paragraphs to lay these out and give evidence for their point of view. Why do they disagree?

#### E – Evaluate

In this paragraph, you want to find holes in the reasons given in the 'disagree' section. You don't agree with their point of view, why is that? What have they said that you think is a weak argument? Where does their evidence fall short?

#### C - Conclude

Summarise your point of view and the BEST reason you have for it. Why is your point of view so much better than any other? You really need to sell it to us.

#### Written/ Reflection Tasks:

- 1. Consider your definitions of the following terms:
  - Truth
  - Reality
  - Good
  - Evil
  - Moral
  - God
  - Time

For each concept, try to argue against your own definition. Can you see any flaws in your ideas? How might they be criticised? What conclusions can you reach about *how* we define these concepts?

- 2. List *five* facts that you *know* to be true. For each one, explain *how* you know it to be true. Are any of your "facts" uncertain? What would have to happen to prove them irrefutably (without question)?
- 3. Create a picture collage, poem, song, mind map or vision board which illustrates the idea of "God". Explain your choices of words, images and concepts. If you can, explain where these have originated.
- 4. Create a fact file of the philosophers Plato, Aristotle and Aquinas. Include pictures, key facts and a brief outline of their philosophical ideas.
- 5. Choose a story from the news that includes one of the following themes:
  - Abortion
  - Euthanasia
  - Capital punishment
  - Humans' treatment of animals

Write a response to the story, considering several different points of view. To help with this, you could consider the points of view of:

- An atheist (someone who fervently believes there is no God)
- An agnostic (someone unsure about religion and faith in God)
- A committed Christian
- A dying man
- A child

- 6. Consider what you already know about the Bible. How far do you think it can be used in the following situations? Give reasons for your point of view.
  - a. To help people understand how the world came into being.
  - b. To teach people right from wrong.
  - c. To instruct what a person should do about Euthanasia.
  - d. To teach people the meaning and purpose of life.

If you watch from 12 minutes you will see William Lane Craig and Christopher Hitchens being introduced. William Lane Craig is a Christian and Christopher Hitchens was a New Atheist.



#### Structure of the talk

The lecture is quite long and so you may wish to watch this in stages. They talk for 20 minutes each and then have a right of reply each.

- William Lane Craig starts at 13 minutes
- Christopher Hitchens starts at 33minutes and 30 seconds
- Williams Lane Craig replies to Christopher Hitchens from 54 minutes and 15 seconds
- Christopher Hitchens replies to William Lane Craig from 1hr and 7 minutes

From one hour 20 minutes there is a cross examination that you may wish to watch.

Having watched the videos Write a response to the following question:

"Should people believe in God?"

In your answer you should:

- Demonstrate understanding of several different viewpoints
- Give clear reasons for each perspective
- Include evidence to support the points you've made
- Give examples to justify your answer
- Reach a clear and justified conclusion



Our studied religion is Christianity and a good background knowledge of the Bible is important and therefore this is what your task is based on.



Using these videos and your own additional research you need to find out about the following Biblical stories, events or characters.

#### 1. The Story of the Fall?

What happens?

How does this story link with Christian ideas about Jesus?

#### 2. The story of Exile

Where, when and why were the Israelites exiled to? What does the prophet Jeremiah teach about exile in Babylon? What is the link with Jesus?

#### 3. The Suffering Servant passages of Isaiah

Who was Isaiah? What is the background to Isaiah's writings? What does Isaiah write about the suffering servant? What is the link with Jesus?

#### 4. <u>The Prophets (there is a Bible project video called prophets)</u> What do prophets do? Who are they?

What do they teach about the covenant? What is the Day of the Lord? What is the link with Jesus?

#### 5. The Messiah

What does the Old Testament teach about the Messiah? Why do Christians believe that Jesus was the Messiah? What Jewish expectations of the Messiah does Jesus not fulfil?

#### 6. <u>Jesus</u>

What are the main events in Jesus' life?

What does Jesus teach in the Sermon on the Mount?

What does Jesus mean when he calls himself the Son of Man? What is the day of the Lord?

## PRACTICE CHRISTIANITY ESSAY QUESTIONS

Use the TRADEC layout to create an essay arguing your point of view on the following topics. You may recognise some of these topics from your GCSE. Lots of the topics we look at, at A Level are similar to the GCSE ones.

If I were you, I'd plan my answer first, for about 5 minutes, thinking about these things...

- Work backwards. What is your conclusion? Do you agree or disagree, and what is your main reason?
- Then think of other reasons to support your point of view. Give specific examples. Can you use a Bible verse (i.e. Easter celebrates the death of Jesus which is found in the Gospel..).
- What reasons might someone have for disagreeing with you. Can you think of two? Can you back up their point of view with an example?
- Why is their point of view rubbish?

#### Essay Questions

- 1. 'The stories of Jesus' birth show no evidence that Jesus was God' (30 marks)
- 2. 'The doctrine of the Trinity is essential to understanding God' (30 marks)
- 3. 'People should be baptised as infants according to Christianity' (30 marks)
